### **SPEAKERS**

#### ***Douglas Weiskopf***

Mr. Weiskopf is a native Houstonian, who grew up playing on the railroad tracks, watching T&NO switchers trundle back and forth between the Port of Houston and Englewood Yard, where his father worked as a switchman, which blessed/cursed him with a life-long love of railroads and trains. He has a BA in History from Baylor University and worked for 25 years in Houston Public Library's Texas and Local History Department. He is actively involved in the Gulf Coast Chapter, NRHS, and has a special interest in railroads of the Civil War and 19th Century Texas railroads. He is the author of *Rails Around Houston*, published in 2009.

Doug will present a slide show called "Houston, Where 17 Railroads Met the Sea." It will consist of a selection of images from his book showing railroading in the Houston area, from the 1850's to the early 1970's.

***Ken Fitzgerald***

Ken Fitzgerald took his first railroad photograph at age 12 in 1967, and is still going strong. His work has appeared in many railroad magazines, books and calendars over the years. He has also been a winner in many photo contests, including three times in Trains Magazine. Ken is currently a contractor to the BNSF, Union Pacific and the Fort Worth & Western as a photographer covering special events and providing photos for company publications.

Ken will present "New Mexico's Abo Canyon and the BNSF Double Track Project" describing the changes that have taken place there since the beginning of the current construction work to add a second main line through the five-mile canyon that started in 2008 and is expected to be completed in 2011.

Robert B. Ray is the Division Director of the Union Pacific Railroad Police headquartered at Spring, Texas. His presentation will focus on railroad policing.
